For instance, when 409 of us donated to the digital materials campaign this spring, we raised \$26,000, which enabled the Library to extend the increased cap on hoopla digital downloads from 8 to 10 items per person through the end of the year – benefiting thousands of people across our community.

Our success came because each of us pitched in what we could. Our individual gifts come in all sizes, and when we join together with hundreds of our neighbors and friends who also give, it adds up fast.

We do this throughout the year, raising important funds for books, furniture, equipment and programs. We could not have a strong Library without widespread community support, so thank you for your commitment!

Library Highlights - You made this possible!

- Launched new STEM Kits: your donations allowed the Library to refresh existing STEM kits and add 26 new kits to the collection this summer, with another 40 coming soon thanks to a grant from Verizon.
- Increased digital materials: Library champions raised \$26,000 for new digital materials this spring.
- Grant for laptops & MiFi: the Library Foundation made an emergency grant in August to the Library to purchase laptops and MiFi for checkout to support patrons with limited technology access during COVID-19 closures and recovery efforts.
- Early Literacy Labs at WIC office: the Library's *Ready to Read Alaska* is creating spaces at four Anchorage offices of the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women Infants and Children to provide books and puzzles for families waiting for appointments (once they reopen from COVID).
- Supported the 2019-20 Tundra Vision talks: an educational and civic space for Alaskans to gather and create a common history through participatory lectures, sponsored by the Atwood Foundation. Recordings of the 2019-20 series can be found at <u>tundravision.digication.com/Tundra/home</u>
- Upgraded furniture and signage at libraries: including a new family reading area at Loussac, a reading nook at Gerish Girdwood, new signs and chairs at Chugiak-Eagle River, and a study bar at Mountain View. Thanks to Aaltje Smith, Johna Rutz, the Van Wyck Family, the Chugiak-Eagle River Foundation, AlaskaUSA Credit Union, Wells Fargo and donors like you for making these projects possible!
- **Peer Navigators:** Rasmuson Foundation made a grant to support the Library's Community Resource program, specifically to launch a Peer Navigator program.
