LIBRARY IMPACT REPORT WINTER 2022-23







Samantha Blanquart, Early Literacy Outreach Librarian, has been with the Anchorage Public Library since 2016, and she has an interesting and unique position within the Library. Her position used to fall under the Alaska State Library shared among many Alaska communities but housed at APL. However, the passage of the Municipality of Anchorage (MOA) Alcoholic Beverages Retail Sales Tax in 2020 allowed the position to become solely for Anchorage residents, expanding its local impact.

Samantha works with different communities in the MOA through online and in-person classes teaching parents and caregivers the best ways to encourage children to read; along with trainings to professionals for continuing education credits. She also placed early literacy stations in various locations around Anchorage. These stations are usually located in areas where children may not have as much access to early literacy materials. Samantha has worked with local businesses, pediatricians, and government offices to ensure that kids have the best materials available at no cost to their parents or caregivers.

Fun Fact: There are six components for early literacy – Oral language, vocabulary, phonological awareness, background knowledge, letter knowledge, and print awareness.

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Early Literacy Cont.

Samantha has taught parents and caregivers the best way to use the early literacy components children need to be successful in kindergarten. Part of her efforts include visiting classrooms in preschools and daycares to encourage early literacy practices. She has relationships with different groups so she is able to help people who are in a position to start literacy practices at home. These practices can be as simple as reading a grocery list together as you make it, or building things out of toilet paper tubes and discussing how they work. Chugiak-Eagle River Library connects with patrons

The Chugiak-Eagle River branch of Anchorage Public Library opened its doors in 2009, and has provided dedicated and diverse programming to the community ever since! In September, the library hosted the Great Alaskan Book Signing with 19 local authors of both adult and children's books. Nancy Clark, the branch manager, started the "Between the Covers" romance book club, which meets virtually and has members from Alaska and the Lower 48. The group has a theme for the month and then chooses their individual book based on the theme. Eagle River also hosts asynchronous programs for young children and teens in the area. These programs allow teens to engage with the community in fun and creative ways, on their own schedule.


